the school welcomes a new principal

The school is saying goodbye to the face of the building in just a few weeks after many years of being a part of this school, Principal Trond Smith. He brought CREST to the community and has been the driving force behind the massive amount of school spirit the students have. Smith will not be stepping down though; he's moving up to be the Director of Administrative Services for the district that includes overseeing all principals in the district and supporting building level administrative teams.

"The special relationships I've been privileged to build with the staff and students here will always be the thing I remember most," Principal Trond Smith said. "Of course, there were incredible and lasting moments each one of the 12 years I've spent at Orange High School, but what will stick with me the longest are the amazing teachers, staff, families and young men and women who I've come to know and care about."

Smith has left a very clear mark on the school that will only continue to flourish once he passes the torch.

"I hope that Orange High School continues to grow in its ability to adapt to a changing educational landscape, and that it prepares its students to be productive, compassionate, and caring citizens. There has always been tremendous pride here, and it is my expectation that that will never change!" Smith said.

With that, a decision has been made as to who will be the one to step up and take on the seat in the Orange chair. The school's new principal is Monica Asher; she has been in education for 17 years, where 13 were spent as an administrator with the last five as principal of Chagrin Falls High School outside of Cleveland.

"I spend a lot of time in the

Columbus area, so I do a lot of work with the Ohio Department of Education. I'm sent in by the board of directors for the Ohio Association of Secondary School Administrators (OASSA), so I'm down here doing advocacy work quite a bit and am familiar with Olentangy by reputation," Asher said. "I decided at the beginning of the year that I wanted to look into this area and when this position opened, I could not apply fast enough. I really wanted to be here so I'm happy that it worked out that way."

Asher will be coming in with just having left her school of five years, making sure she feels welcome is key to a smooth transition.

"My first year will really just be building relationships and getting to know people. This school belongs to you, and it belongs to the teachers. It belongs to the people that have been here, so I don't want to come in and put my stamp on it. I want to be able to amplify your voices and the things you want and give you ownership and leadership," Asher said.

A balanced leader is what's kept this school running the way it has, one that cares that the students are doing well academically but also doing well with one another. Making sure that their students leave the school as good people; Smith is leaving the school in good hands.

"The focus is on the whole child, so I look at the learner profile and the fact that creativity and kindness are things that are mentioned. Being able to work with kids in more than just academics but who they want to be as people," Asher said. "It's really easy to lean into the academic side of things, which I love, but it's more important that we're good people so I think the focus there is really cool."
